SEATTLE-Woodland Park Zoo will be able to reduce its information technology costs as well as save money on power and HVAC use thanks to a \$1.8 million software donation from Microsoft.



The donation provided the zoo with a significant amount of licensing software to support its overall operations. "The majority of Microsoft's donation was expensive server software and desktop software," said Bill Brown, director of information systems at Woodland Park Zoo. "It's all software we would've had to purchase in the next three years so it provides us a significant amount of savings and functionality."

Among the software products the zoo received is Microsoft Hyper-V., which will allow the zoo to reduce the number of physical servers by virtualizing them, in turn helping the zoo to cut IT costs, cooling costs and power requirements. It also reduces the zoo's carbon footprint. Other software products the zoo received include: Microsoft Server, Microsoft Exchange Server, Microsoft End-Point, Microsoft Sharepoint, Microsoft Remote Desktop Services, Microsoft Windows and Microsoft Office.

"This software is the backbone of our operations," said Brown. "We couldn't be more grateful to Microsoft for their generous donation which allows the zoo to continue to perform at the highest level."
