Zoo's hippo making kiss "painting" to be raffled off at Spring Safari: African Wildlife Conservation Day



No one can resist a hippo kiss; a hippo kiss painting that is. Woodland Park Zoo will raffle off a one-of-a-kind hippo kiss "painting," made by the zoo's very own hippo kiss "painting" artist, 15-year-old female hippo Guadalupe, at the new Spring Safari event.

The press is invited to the hippo barn to watch Guadalupe create the raffle prize painting on Wednesday, April 13, 2:30 p.m.

The zoo's hippos have been taught to hold still and allow keepers to give them thorough exams for food rewards. The hippo kiss "painting" is created by applying non-toxic paint to the hippo's mouth, then having the hippo hold very still while a person gently presses a sheet of paper onto her lips, so a painting is created and the hippo gets the treats!

takes place Saturday, April 16, 9:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m.

The zoo's Spring Safari event will celebrate the African savanna and the amazing animals that live there with a full day of activities focused on migration patterns of African animals, educational keeper talks, and special enrichment sessions to heighten awareness about issues such as illegal poaching and habitat loss, and how your choices and actions can help save giraffe, lions, ostrich and other critical savanna animals. Hippos are the third largest living land mammal and one of the most iconic of the African savanna species. Their huge mouths can open to a massive 150 degrees (or 4 feet wide) and their lips are 2 feet wide.



Hippopotamuses are listed as a vulnerable species, primarily because humans have excessively hunted hippos for their meat, fat, ivory teeth and hides. Woodland Park Zoo participates in several field conservation projects which support activities that directly contribute to the long-term survival of species in natural ecosystems and habitats; several of these projects are located in the hippo's native habitat of Africa.
