Summer happenings at Woodland Park Zoo

Visit the new Molbak's Butterfly Garden: last day is Sept. 13

Stroll among a variety of Pacific Northwest gardens and experience North American butterflies in the new, immersive Molbak's Butterfly Garden. Woodland Park Zoo's newest exhibit emphasizes both the fragility and resilience of nature through the display of what many consider to be among the most beautiful of natural expressions: butterflies and flowers.



An arching tent structure encloses a landscape of approximately 3,000 square feet and features more than 500 butterflies of at least 15 species native to North America. Learn about the biology, behavior, and threats facing these winged beauties, and be inspired to take local and global conservation action for butterflies and other pollinators during an immersive journey through the varying habitats where these North American species are found. The seasonal Butterfly Garden is free with zoo admission and is open through Sept. 13, 2016.

Don't miss baby gorilla Yola

Don't forget to stop by the gorilla exhibit to see baby gorilla Yola growing and exploring the outdoors with mom. The female western lowland gorilla was born at the zoo last November and met the community for the first time in June. Yola, mom Nadiri, and the other two members who live with her, Leonel and Akenji, are in the outdoor exhibit 12:30-4:30 p.m. daily. Take a Banyan Wilds Trek and join the Tiger Team

Fewer than 350 Malayan tigers survive in the heart of the wild, but there is still hope. The Banyan Wilds Trek, offered 1:30 p.m. daily, leads you into the forests of Malayan tigers, sloth bears, Asian small-clawed otters and more. Hear how Woodland Park Zoo and Panthera work with on-the-ground partners in Malaysia to protect tigers and their forest homes. Family Farm Contact Area - 11:00 a.m.-5:00 p.m. daily

Touch domestic farm animals and learn more about them in supervised areas at the Family Farm. Free with zoo admission.

Willawong Station - The Bird Feeding Experience - 9:30 a.m.-6:00 p.m. daily

This popular walk-through bird feeding experience transports you to the world of the Australian parrot and the Australian grasslands habitat. Willawong Station is a fun opportunity for the whole family to get up close and feed birds in a controlled, safe environment while learning about responsible care for birds both in the wild and at home.
