Red panda celebrates birthday with 4th of July-themed treats! *Animals show their patriotism with Red, White & Zoo July 1-2*

WHAT: As folks gear up for Fourth of July barbecues, fireworks, camping, swimming and other recreation, Woodland Park Zoo will honor its popular red panda, Carson, who turns 3 over the weekend. Carson will be treated to a special snack made especially for a red panda and holiday-themed treats Friday, June 30, to celebrate his special day.

The handsome red panda's birthday celebration ushers in the zoo's annual **Red, White & Zoo**—a "wild" picnic for lemurs, otters, grizzly bears, meerkats, wolves, and more—**Saturday–Sunday, July 1–2**. Star-shaped popsicles, watermelon, corn on the cob and other picnic favorites are on the menu for the animals.

<u>Carson</u> has endeared himself to tens of thousands of zoo guests since he made his debut last April. Born at Lincoln Children's Zoo in Lincoln, Neb., he was named after the famous television host Johnny Carson, who shared the panda's birth city.

The Fourth of July-themed treats are part of the excellent animal care program at Woodland Park Zoo and the zookeepers' ongoing efforts to help <u>enrich the lives of the animals</u>, promote natural animal behavior, keep animals mentally and physically stimulated, and engage zoo visitors.

<u>Red pandas</u> share the name of giant pandas, but more closely resemble raccoons. While scientists still debate which family red pandas belong to—raccoons or giant pandas—recent studies suggest they are equally related to three different groups of animals that include skunks, weasels and raccoons.

In the wild, fewer than 10,000 red pandas remain in their native habitat of bamboo forests in China, the Himalayas and Myanmar, and share part of their range with giant pandas. Their numbers are declining due to deforestation, increased agriculture and cattle grazing, and continuing pressure from growing local populations.
