WHAT: Hippos will chomp on pumpkins and otters will splash around and play with pumpkins at a press photo op on **Thursday, October 26**.

The pumpkins for animals kicks off Woodland Park Zoo's **Pumpkin Bash**, **held Saturday–Sunday**, **October 28–29**. The weekend-long Halloween fun includes hippos, grizzlies, meerkats, penguins, snow leopards, and other animals chomping on or playing with pumpkins and other fall-themed treats while little goblins and ghosts trick-or-treat and enjoy pumpkin displays and other spook-tacular activities. Not-so-scary storytelling, costumed puppet shows, games and more will be held for young guests in the indoor, Halloween-themed Boomazium. From 11:00 a.m. to 2:30 p.m., Mad Science, a dry ice extravaganza, will be featured in the Rain Forest Food Pavilion where spectators will be fascinated with shivering cold coins, Boo Bubbles, dry ice burps, spooky fog effects and famous bubble showers. Halloweenthemed treats, including cupcakes and cookies, will be available for purchase in the Rain Forest Food Pavilion.
