Learn to coexist with Pacific Northwest carnivores

WHAT:

Curious about the wild carnivores that live in your neighborhood? Woodland Park Zoo is teaming up with the Issaguah School District and the City of Issaguah to provide several events to help local communities learn and share thoughts about coexisting with Pacific Northwest carnivores.

Through the Coexisting With Carnivores project, Issaguah middle school students, families, and residents will gain knowledge of local carnivores and their role in creating healthy local ecosystems, as well as engage in community-driven learning and problem-solving around issues of human-wildlife interaction in a growing region.

The project consists of two components:

Wild Wise: Coexisting With Carnivores, a partnership between Woodland Park Zoo and Issaguah School District, offers middle school students a chance to develop science inquiry, civic literacy, and leadership skills as they investigate and share solutions for living with the carnivores in their communities. The culmination of this component is a town hall style event in June where students share findings from their scientific investigations on how carnivores use resources in the Issaguah area to meet their needs. The students also provide evidence-based recommendations that assist the community in making carnivore positive choices.

Our Community, Our Carnivores, a program co-facilitated by Woodland Park Zoo and the City of Issaguah, focuses on communitydeveloped strategies to prevent human-wildlife conflict in the region and foster a sense of pride for local wildlife. Woodland Park Zoo and its partners will host open houses in May in Issaguah featuring community learning activities focused on human-carnivore interactions in the Issaquah area.

Coexisting With Carnivores is a project of Woodland Park Zoo's <u>Living Northwest</u> program that supports field conservation projects in the Pacific Northwest. The project is funded through a grant from the Institute of Museum and Library Services. The three-year grant allows Woodland Park Zoo to establish a community-based science education and conservation model that equips residents in Issaquah, Wash. to coexist safely with carnivores.

Issaquah and the neighboring communities of east King County lie at the intersection of expanding urban settlement and iconic wilderness. Surrounded by forested mountains on three sides and Lake Sammamish to the north, the area is also home to abundant wildlife including some of Washington's most charismatic carnivores: black bears, coyotes, bobcats and cougars. At the interface of urbanization and wilderness, there is sometimes human-animal conflict. As the Pacific Northwest region continues to grow, it is critical that families learn how to coexist with wildlife and appreciate nature around them. Coexisting With Carnivores allows Woodland Park Zoo to continue its successful work with local schools and have a deeper engagement with local communities about this important issue.
