## A royal hatching at the zoo: a princess parrot

As the world eagerly awaits the royal wedding for Britain's Prince Harry and his bride-to-be Meghan Markle. Woodland Park Zoo announces its own roval event: the hatching of a princess parrot. The press is invited to meet the royal chick behind the scenes on Friday, May 18.

The princess parrot hatched May 14 to mom Jolene and dad Ollie and is the first offspring for the parents. The parents live in the zoo's Willawong Station but are currently rearing their chick off public view.

A medium-sized bird native to Australia's arid interior, the princess parrot is also known as Princess of Wales parakeet and by other names. The species was named in honor of Princess Alexandra of Denmark who later married Britain's future King Edward VII, the great-great-great-grandfather of Prince Harry. The princess parrot is known for its loving, gentle disposition; its plumage is a striking green with a pink throat, green shoulders and blue rump.

The princess parrot is listed as near threatened under the IUCN (International Union for Conservation of Nature) Red List of Threatened Species. Threats may include a wide range of habitat changes and the introduction of predators such as cats and red foxes.
