## Wild Asia: Asian Wildlife Conservation Day pays tribute to zoo's Asian animals and conservation projects abroad

WHAT:

Celebrate Asia's breathtaking wildlife while learning how you can help protect them at Woodland Park Zoo's Wild Asia: Asian Wildlife Conservation Day. Saturday, August 11, from 9:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. Learn how your choices and actions can help save the lives of Malayan tigers, greater one-horned rhinos, orangutans, tree kangaroos and other endangered species.

This full day of activities shines a spotlight on Asia's diverse and fascinating species, from massive rhinos to playful otters, highlighting the necessary conservation efforts critical to their survival in the wild.

Attend animal keeper talks and enrichment sessions throughout the day to see some of the zoo's Asian animals and learn how the zoo is working to preserve their counterparts in the wild with the help of the Partners for Wildlife and Wildlife Survival Fund conservation programs. Guests at any keeper talk can collect a set of 12 animal collectible cards, each featuring an animal living at Woodland Park Zoo such as Taj the greater one-horned rhino or Olan the Malayan tiger. Most Wild Asia keeper talks will include special enrichment for the animals such as hidden food or scented items for the animals to find. Enrichment is part of the animal keepers' ongoing efforts to help enrich the lives of the zoo's animals, promote natural animal behavior, keep animals mentally and physically stimulated and engage zoo visitors.

Families can enjoy a day full of fun at Kids Discovery Zone, located at the zoo's Peacock Plaza. Kids can get creative with fun crafts, build a tiger preserve, learn about all of the wild animals and places in Asia and much more. In the afternoon, guests can visit the zoo's newly-opened Assam Rhino Reserve for an exciting, up-close and personal encounter with the zoo's two greater one-horned rhinos, Taj and Glenn.
