
Zoo for All: Honoring Those Who Serve

WHAT:

Woodland Park Zoo is hosting Honoring Those Who Serve, a celebration of U.S. military personnel and their families to come and enjoy the zoo. Free admission will be given to veterans, reservists, retired and active U.S. military personnel plus one family member with valid service identification.



Acclimating to civilian life is a constant struggle for many veterans and military members, requiring support and resources, regardless of identity and inner strength. That's why Woodland Park Zoo is partnering with several organizations that will be on zoo grounds for Honoring Those Who Serve offering services and resources, including Wounded Warriors, Outdoors for All, VA Puget Sound Health Care, Seattle Vet Center, Red Cross, WAServes, Edmonds Community College Veterans Affairs, Minority Veterans of America, WA Department of Veterans Affairs, Heroes Café and OARS for Women Veterans.

Honoring Those Who Serve is part of Zoo for All, a series of events and engagements the zoo is undertaking to reach communities that are often underserved or overlooked in society.

The event is held during Evening Zoo with extended hours until 8:30 p.m. Evening Zoo features ambassador animal presentations, animal keeper talks, music and games, a beer and wine garden for guests 21 and over, and Zoomazium nature play space for kids.

WHERE: Woodland Park Zoo: Enter through West Entrance at Phinney Ave. N. between N. 55th & N. 56th Sts.

Guest speakers and workshops will be in the Center for Wildlife Conservation.

COST:

Free admission for active, reserve, retired, and veteran U.S. military personnel *plus* one family member with valid service identification. General admission through September 30: Adult (13-64) \$20.95; Child (3-12) \$12.95; Toddler (0-2) Free. Zoo members receive free admission year round. Parking: \$6 plus applicable state and local taxes.

INFO:

Summer zoo hours through September 30: 9:30 a.m.–6:00 p.m. daily. Evening Zoo: after hours until 8:30 p.m.

Parking is limited. Consider taking the bus, biking, walking or carpooling. Conserving resources is one more way to help animals. The zoo offers a \$2 discount to anyone who rides the bus to the zoo. Must show proof—bus transfer or ORCA card—at ticket window. For bus service to the zoo, visit www.metro.kingcounty.gov.

Quarters for Conservation: A portion of your zoo admission and membership is dedicated to funding conservation programs in the wild. Cast your vote for your favorite conservation project at the Quarters for Conservation kiosks located at each entrance.

Mobile app: Download the free Woodland Park Zoo mobile app for iPhone, iPad or Android from your app store. Use it to track your location on zoo grounds with GPS, discover more about animals and daily zoo activities, and share the highlights of your visit with friends.

Wi-Fi: Free Wi-Fi is available throughout the zoo for zoo guests, made possible through products donated by Cisco.

Gifts/food: Explore the ZooStores for extraordinary gifts and zoo souvenirs. Stop by the Rain Forest Food Pavilion or other concessionaire locations to quench your thirst or appetite. On your way out of the zoo for the evening, consider visiting one of many dining options in the neighborhood.
