A packing list has been provided to make sure you bring all you need to complete this backpack.

All animals have five basic needs (water, food, air, shelter, space),

but those needs look different for every animal. Can you build a

habitat that has everything your animal needs?

AT THE ZOO: Build a Habitat

Time: 15 minutes


Materials: Piece of paper, crayons

Instructions:

- I. Find a comfortable spot to sit and pull out your piece of paper and crayons.
- 2. Pick an animal you would like to build a habitat for. Maybe it's a family pet, a rhinoceros, a python or a beetle.
- 3. Talk with your child about what that animal might need to live. You can ask questions such as:
 - a. Where might the animal sleep?
 - b. What does the animal eat? How does it get their food?
 - c. Does the animal need a lot of space or just a little?
 - d. Does this animal like to live with other animals?
 - e. Is the animal awake at night or during the day?
 - f. What kind of ground does the animal need? Rocks? Trees? Sand? Dirt? Grasses? Ice?
- 4. Then you and your child should draw your animal's habitat on your paper.



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AT THE ZOO: I'm a Little Animal

You and your child will review the body coverings for different groups of animals through a short song.

Time: 5 minutes • Materials: None

Instructions:

- I. Sing different verses of "I'm a little animal" and pause after each verse. Ask your child to share what animal or group of animals they think matches the clues in the song verse.
- 2. You can even make up your own verses!
- 3. This song is to the tune of "I'm a little teapot."



I'm a little animal with fins and a tail. I breathe underwater and have lots of scales. Who am I? (fish) I'm a little animal with hollow bones. A beak and feathers and a nest I call home. Who am I? (bird) I'm a little animal with smooth, wet skin. I'm born in the water but I live on the land. Who am I? (amphibian)

I'm a little animal with fur or hair. My mother gave me milk and raised me with care. Who am I? (mammal) l'm a little animal with dry, scaly skin. You can find my eggs buried in the sand. Who am I? (reptile)



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AT THE ZOO: Story Time

Pack a book from home and spend some time in a cozy corner of the zoo reading together.

Time: 10 minutes • Materials: Story Book

Instructions:

- I. Find a cozy spot at the zoo to sit and pull out the story book you packed for your trip.
- 2. Read the story together taking turns sounding out words, reading pages and looking at the illustrations.
- 3. As you read ask questions such as:
 - a. What do you think is going to happen next?
 - b. How would you feel if that happened to you?
 - c. Can you find something hidden or an animal in the photo?





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AT THE ZOO: Zoo Bingo

There are so many things to do and see at the zoo. How many can you finish during your visit?

Time: Throughout your visit • Materials: Animal Behavior Bingo card, crayon

Instructions:

- I. Take out your zoo bingo card and read each of the boxes with your child.
- 2. You can choose to complete a row or complete the whole card!
- 3. As you explore the zoo check off any experiences you complete.
- 4. Let your child guide this activity choosing which boxes you go for and checking off completed boxes.

Find an animal track	Look for an animal that is eating	Pretend to be an animal
