	Sloth bears live in forests and grasslands in Bangladesh, Bhutan, India, Nepal and Sri Lanka, so the animal keepers have selected names in Hindi:
	Jangel (JAHN-gal) – Forest Madhu (muh-DOO) – Sweet, Honey Pahar (pah-HAAR) – Mountain Rajesh (RAJ-esh) – God of Kings (formal) Raju (RAW-joo) – God of Kings (informal, more endearing)
	The cub and his sister were born on New Year's Day 2022 to first-time mom Kushali (kuu-SHAW-lee) and dad Bhutan (boo-TAHN). The girl cub will be named by special friends of the zoo.
WHEN:	Vote on a name at <u>www.zoo.org/slothbearnaming</u> starting April 18 through April 21, at noon (PDT)
INFO:	Mom Kushali and her cubs are slowly being introduced to the outdoor exhibit in Banyan Wilds; the viewing windows are temporarily obstructed as Kushali adjusts to navigating the habitat with her frisky cubs. Soon, zoo-goers will be able to see the cubs climbing, playing and piggy backing on mom. Among all bear species, sloth bears are the only moms that carry their cubs on their back; the cubs will ride her until they're 6 to 9 months old.
	Bear Necessities Sloth bears are a vulnerable species. Their survival is challenged by conflicts with humans and animals for space and food caused by deforestation, the bear parts trade for use in traditional Asian medicines and fragmented populations.
