The bipartisan Recovering America's Wildlife Act (RAWA) dedicates \$1.3 billion annually for state level wildlife conservation and \$97.5 million to tribal nations to restore wildlife populations and prevent fish and wildlife from becoming endangered. If RAWA passes, Washington state will receive \$24.6 million annually to implement science-based conservation strategies, and on-the-ground projects for recovering and restoring the species that need the most intervention. Woodland Park Zoo supports RAWA and urges Congress

to include it in a comprehensive funding bill by the end of the year. For more information and to take action, please visit www.zoo.org/rawa.
